MARIYAMMAN IS A HINDU GODDESS who is very popular in South India. From very early times she has been associated with small pox and other similar diseases. Every year the elaborate ceremonies celebrated in honor of Mariyamman attract a great deal of popular participation. This study, based on personal observations of the festivities by the author in the city Palani in the years 1980 and 1981, attempts to describe and analyze, from a cultural perspective, the thermodynamic aspects of the ritual of the goddess.

The Babylonian Curative Arts: Sources for Their Study

THE BABYLONIAN CURATIVE ARTS can be studied from a variety of sources, especially literary ones, whose interpretation requires knowledge of cuneiform, Akkadian and Sumerian. The "magical" texts of ancient Mesopotamia, which form an important part of this literature, have been particularly well studied. This essay gives a detailed survey of the sources that are especially linked with the more empirical aspects of Babylonian medicine, without neglecting the necessary references to magical and religious sources as well.

The Palindrome Outside of the Occident: The Chinese and Japanese Traditions

THE CONCEPT OF "PALINDROME" as recently defined in the *Diccionario de Retórica y Poética* (México, D. F., 1985) is amplified in light of Chinese and Japanese practice. In all, one heptasyllabic *chüeh-chü* (by Su Shih (1036-1101)) and three anonymous *haiku*—all palindromic— are analyzed. Similar patterns in Korean and Vietnamese are hipothesized as probable.
